President's Update

Hopewell Landfill Recreation Area

Many of you may be aware of the YCSWA's attempted proposal to reopen the Hopewell Landfill. This was met with serious concerns from community members worried about the effects of truck traffic and noise as well as nature enthusiasts who treasure the unique grassland habitat that is home to many birds such as Grasshopper and Savannah Sparrows, Eastern Meadowlarks, Blue Grosbeaks, and American Kestrels. The grasslands is also a favorite wintering grounds of the Short-eared Owl and Northern Harrier and one of the best places in York County to spot migrating Wilson's Snipe, Bobolinks, and Dickcissels. There is also a small patch of trees which has been home to breeding Red-Headed Woodpeckers for at least a decade.

Many thanks to Alice Simmons who spoke up at the public meeting to represent Audubon and educate the community about the importance of the habitat at Hopewell. As a result of Alice's comments, a group of local residents (now known as the Hopewell Birders) became interested in learning more about the birds of this special habitat and Alice obliged by leading several bird walks for the community at Hopewell. Fortunately, the Hopewell township board voted against the re-opening of the landfill and it appears that it is safe for the time being.

Kiwanis Lake Native Plant Gardens

Many thanks to Deb Carman who has spearheaded an effort to evaluate and maintain the native gardens that were planted several years ago at Kiwanis Lake (Farquhar Park) as part of PA Audubon's Plants for Birds Program. These gardens are located in an area that is heavily frequented by the general public and they present an excellent opportunity to educate others about the beauty and value of planting native plants. Deb is developing a plan to involve both YAS and local community members in maintaining and improving the beauty of these gardens.

YAS Donates Birding Backpack to York County Library

In an effort to try to promote birding in York County, the York Audubon Society has donated a "Birding Backpack" to the York County Library System. The backpack is a comprehensive birding kit that includes two pair of Nikon binoculars, a National Geographic Bird Field Guide for kids, the Kaufman Field Guide to Birds of North America, pocket guide to Pennsylvania Birds, a Birding Bingo game, a Birding Backpack Binder containing a quick start to birding, binocular tips, and a guide to birding York County. The backpack is appropriate for both children and adults and can be borrowed from the library like a book for a 3 week time period.



Spring Programs at YAS Focus on Natives

It has been great getting back in the groove of meeting regularly again. As we come out of a great series of programs this fall, I look forward to our programs in the spring. Our focus in March and April is on native plants and sustainable landscaping. 123rd Christmas Bird Count

December 17 marked the 123rd CBC, making it the nation's longest-running community science bird project. York's CBC centered on Lake Marburg in Codorus State Park. On this partly cloudy day, 24 birders composed of 8 teams set out to count the number of birds and species within our 7.5 mile radius. At the end of the day, 73 species and 7,069 birds were tallied. The number of species has been fairly consistent over the last four years ranging between 72 and 75. Unusual birds included Wilson's Snipe and an Osprey. Not found on this day were Wild Turkeys. The birders met around noon for a break at the Codorus Park Office for lunch and a discussion of what was found. The results of the CBC will be included with the data base with Audubon National covering North and South America, which will be analyzed for trends, now especially a concern with climate change.



Join us for outdoor adventures at different locations in York County each week as we explore to see what birds are in the area. These are informal walks and anyone with an interest in nature is welcome to attend, regardless of skill level or membership status. In fact, these walks are an excellent opportunity to learn about birding and nature. No registration required.
